English:

Cloud Tea Monkeys:

Outcomes: Descriptive passages, writing in role, instructions, letter, discussion

Main outcome: Non-chronological report

This unit begins with the arrival of a Royal Tea –Taster in class seeking apprentice tea-tasters. The children experience an immersive session where they smell and taste a range of different teas and create descriptive statements. We then move on to read the moving story about Cloud Tea and how monkeys save a young girl and her mother. The children are exposed to range of language activities to stimulate grammatical development and reading comprehension skills. Using the authors' note, children research, plan and then write a non-chronological report on tea, the tea-trade and traditions relating to tea.

Cinderella of the Nile:

Outcomes: News report, diary entry, character description, advert

Main outcome: Own version traditional tale

This unit begins with the discovery of a bottle that contains a map and a message. After interrogating the scenario presented and writing a short news report using the present perfect tense, the children then share the first part of Cinderella of the Nile. They develop skills of inference before exploring the author's use of literary language and the effect that this has on the reader. Once the story has been read, the children sort statements about traditional Cinderella tales and statements about this version then go on to devise their own version of a Cinderella story complete with fable!
